Career Goals

- Do I want to specialize in a specific clinical area (e.g., oncology, cardiology, critical care)?
- Am I aiming for a position that typically requires a pharmacy residency (hospital pharmacist, academia, industry fellowship, or something else)?
- Would I prefer to enter community/retail, managed care, fellowship opportunity or industry, where residency may not be required?
- Do I have a clear 5-year career plan, or am I still exploring?

Clinical Training Needs

- Do I feel confident in my current clinical skills, or do I need additional structured training?
- Do I value the mentorship, precepting, and advanced learning environment residency provides?
- Have preceptors or mentors suggested that a residency would enhance my career trajectory?

Financial Considerations

- Can I afford another year (or two) with a modest residency stipend vs. a pharmacist salary?
- Do I have significant student loan debt that makes immediate employment more appealing?
- Am I open to delaying higher earnings for long-term career advancement?

Lifestyle & Personal Factors

- Am I willing to commit to 50–60+ hours per week during residency?
- Do I want to relocate for training, or would I prefer stability in one location?
- Do I value work–life balance now, or am I comfortable sacrificing short-term balance for long-term growth?

Job Market & Opportunities

- What is the job market like in my desired location? Are professional pharmacy roles available without residency?
- Do employers in my area strongly prefer residency-trained pharmacists?
- Are there alternative training pathways (e.g., certificate programs, industry fellowships, on-the-job training) that could support my goals?

Professional Development

- Do I want structured teaching, research, and leadership opportunities?
- Would I benefit from earning a teaching certificate or publishing during residency?
- Am I motivated by building a strong professional network early through residency programs and conferences?

Personal Readiness

- Am I excited about continuing as a learner, with intensive evaluation and feedback?
- Do I feel prepared to transition immediately into a pharmacist role and take on full responsibility?
- Do I thrive in structured training environments, or do I prefer independence and flexibility?

Decision Reflection

- Residency aligns with my long-term career goals and offers training I need.
- Workforce entry allows me to earn, repay loans, and gain practical experience right away.
- I've talked through my options with mentors, preceptors, and recent grads.
